What is Learning?

A big part of learning is about getting knowledge to go into your long term memory and then using this knowledge. Our brains will only remember knowledge in the long term if we think really hard about it. Just reading, or highlighting does not make our brains work hard enough. We must practise remembering things.

What is a knowledge organiser?

A knowledge organiser is a document that contains key facts and information that you will need to have a basic knowledge and understanding of a topic. A knowledge organiser will not include every possible fact on a topic; it will include facts needed to understand the main points.

Your knowledge organisers will include: the essential facts about the topic, laid out in easily digestible chunks; key vocabulary or technical terms and their meanings; images such as maps or diagrams; and where relevant famous quotations.

What is a self-quizzing diary?

A self-quizzing diary is where you will write the questions and answers each night for your homework. These diaries can then be used throughout your education here at Da Vinci Academy to help with revision.

Why are knowledge organisers good for learning?

Research shows that our brains remember things more efficiently when we know the 'bigger picture' and can see the way that 'nuggets' of knowledge link. Making links helps information move into our long-term memory. A knowledge organiser shows linked facts on a single topic.

Knowledge organisers can be used for retrieval practice (practising remembering things). Regular retrieval of knowledge helps us remember more effectively with our long term memory.

Knowledge organisers make knowledge clear. So, even if you miss a lesson, you have a constant point of reference.

How can you best use your knowledge organiser?

There are many ways you can use your knowledge organiser. The most important thing to say is "use it." Owing one does not make you remember facts... you must practice if you are to improve at anything! Self-quizzing is one really good way of using your knowledge organiser, but you can use it however else you like. You will make mistakes – this is how you learn.

What is self-quizzing?

Self-quizzing is one of the best ways for you to learn the key knowledge you need to know for each subject.

Each subject has created the key knowledge you need to know for each term, and your homework is to self-quiz each evening on the different subjects.

Your self-quizzing timetable will be given to you at the start of the year, and each day has space for you to write down the questions you are asking yourself, and your answers.

Each morning your tutor will check if you have completed your self-quizzing during roll call. Each time you complete your self-quizzing homework, you will receive an A Point. Each time you do not complete your self-quizzing, you will go to study support that evening to complete it.

How to Self-Quiz

1. Each night, check Go 4 Schools to see which part of your Knowledge Organiser your teacher is asking you to focus on.
2. Read this section of the knowledge organiser, and write 10 questions about the part you are reading.
3. Close your knowledge organiser.
4. Write the answers to the questions, without looking back in your knowledge organiser.
5. Check to see if you got your answers correct. Mark your work in red pen.
6. If you got a question wrong, you may want to add it to the questions for that subject next time.

Examples of Questions

1. **What is** the definition of a poem?
2. **What does** the body use carbohydrates for?
3. **List** the sources of carbohydrates.
4. **Who was** Romeo Montague?
5. **How are** elements grouped together?
6. **When was** the Domesday Book written?
7. **Which of these** is the correct definition of an Isometric projection?
8. Wat Tyler was the leader of the peasant revolt. **True or False?**

You can also turn the questions around to make them more **challenging**.

2. Which nutrient provides energy for the body?

How to self-quiz in French

Look, Say, Cover, Write, Check



When self-quizzing in Languages, there is an additional 'layer of learning' that needs to happen before you are able to complete your self-quizzing in your planner.

As you are learning a foreign language, you first need to learn the vocabulary before you are able to quiz yourself. This is very similar to when you first started learning English in primary school and had to practise your spellings by using the 'Look, Cover, Write, Check' method.

In French, you will create sentences using your knowledge organisers and then you will use the 'Look, Say, Cover, Write, Check' method in order to learn these sentences on paper. When you feel confident, you will then self-quiz in your planners by writing out the English sentence as your question, and translating it into French as your answer. This is your self quizzing.

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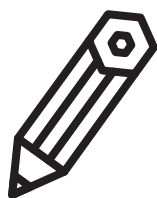
2. **Say** the line aloud to practise your pronunciation and phonics.
